


The becoming of a Discordian

Alan Moore once said: "Art is, like magic, the science of manipulating symbols, words, or images, to achieve changes in consciousness". I wholeheartedly agree, I think reading a book that changes your conciousness can be described as a magic ritual, even if that's not how it's construed at the time. I can look back at a few times in my life when I have read books that have had a profound impact on me, have changed the way I look at the world and the way I relate to it. Sometimes this change comes instantly and sometimes it comes creeping up on me over time. Two times these experiences has inspired me as a Discordian.

The first book is what made me discover Discordianism. Some years ago, feeling a need for solitude and to get away from the world, I rented a cottage in the Swedish countryside for a week. Equipped with not much more than my hiking boots and a bunch of books, I spent the dark november days wandering the woods, and the even darker november evenings going through my book pile.




When Ι started reading KLFChaos, Magic and band who burned a million pounds, Ι was floored. I initially bought the book because I'm interested in the English 80's and early 90's music scene, but as it turned out, this book is about so much more than this. Weaving in discordianism,

which have had a big impact on the KLF, with Alan Moore, Doctor Who, situationism and theories about synchronicity, this is a fantstic read. After I finished the book, I went out for a long walk. I could feel something had changed inside of me, so many new ideas and perspectives coming alive. When coming home from my vacation, I ordered the Principia Dis-

cordia, printed a bunch of pope cards, and started my Discordian journey. This is how I found Eris.





The other book, or pamphlet, I found at principiadiscordia.com. It's called The Black Iron Prison, referencing Phillip K. Dick's novel VALIS. The pamphlet is collection of texts, most of them about the Black Iron Prison we are all trapped in - our "tired, montonous life". This pamphlet really

struck a chord in me. Not so much an eye-opener, but rather that it made me realise that most of my favorite books - Fight Club, Revolutionary Road, Dharma Bums, among others - were about just that, escaping the Black Iron Prison. Also, it was the thing that made me realise that Discordianism is very much alive and kicking, and inspired me to start up my own project.
